### ZION EVANGELICAL LUTHERAN CHURCH ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES – NOVEMBER 13, 2022

**<u>Call to Order</u>**: Council President Lindsey Wagner called meeting to order.

**Quorum:** Parliamentarian John Chesters noted that quorum has been met.

The meeting is being presented in person in the Sanctuary and on Zoom via livestream and telephone and is being recorded.

### Prayer: by Pastor Carnes

Approval of Annual Meeting November 14, 2021 minutes: Motion by Lee Ober to approve the minutes as presented. Second by Lisa Flood. Motion carried.

### **<u>Treasurer's Report:</u>** Don Long for Barb Breneman

- General fund giving is up compared to 2021.
- Spending is under budget for the first 9 months of 2022.
- Hard to compare to the past two years during the pandemic as well as switching of staff positions.
- Giving is less than the operating expenses by about \$21,000 for the first 9 months.

Motion by Charlie Houck to approve the treasurer's report as present. Second by Mary Chesters. Motion carried.

### 2023 Budget: Don Long:

- Requested to committees on tightening the budget not to eliminate programs but making smart choices. Committee is realistic that some things like utilities will need to increase.
- 2023 Budget is about \$13,000 less than 2022.
- In 2022, the finance committee and council approved a formula for pulling money out of the investment. This year it will be about \$17,000. This is a safety net for any emergencies but to help with end of the year shortfalls if needed.
- The finance/property committees also has a list of ongoing special property projects. This year there is a \$10,000 item for sidewalk replacement along Lemon Street. The Borough is requiring everyone along Lemon Street to replace broken pieces since they are repaying the road. We will get bids in early 2023 since it will need to be replaced by August 31, 2023. Council will make the final decision once we get bids but will probably do a special appeal in 2023 to help pay for it.

Motion by Lee Ober to approve the 2023 budget. Second by Shawn Serfass. Motion carried.

**Committee Reports:** Committee reports were part of the Annual Report. No questions.

### **Recognition of Outgoing Council Members:**

- Thank you to Sam Maurer stepping into the position mid- term and starting up the fellowship committee again in the middle of a pandemic.

- Motion by Glenn Hess to close nominations. Second by Emilie Krause. Motion carried.
- Motion by Todd Silliman to elect Charlie Houck, Cameron Mondock and Lindsey Wagner to council for three-year terms. Second by Steve Witter. Motion carried.

### PASTOR'S REPORT 2023

Dear People of Zion East Petersburg,

"And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him." Colossians 3:17

Thank you! Thank you for a beautiful and glorious Installation Service and Celebration. Thank you for your hospitality and welcome toward Ed and me. Thank you for your kindness and patience as I am getting to know you. Thank you for your partnership and willingness to "hear me out." Thank you for your forgiveness and grace when I have made mistakes. Thank you for your faith in the gospel of Jesus Christ, and for the many ways your faithful actions and obedience to follow the teaching of Jesus with one another and in the community of East Petersburg and the world have blessed and humbled me.

God has been preparing the people of Zion and me to walk together in faith since the beginning of time. On February 15, 2023, the time for us to come together began with a Zoom meeting. The Call Committee and I met to get to know one another. When the time ended, I felt as if this was a "match made in Heaven." Next came the in-person meeting with the Call Committee on February 27, 2023.

We shared a meal, a Bible Study, and spent more time getting to know one another. One thing led to another, and on May 14, I got to meet most of you at breakfast. Then we worshiped together and praised God and sang. It was glorious. I felt as if I had come home. I was so relieved when you all voted unanimously to call me to be your pastor, and without hesitation or doubt I accepted.

The months since have passed by much too quickly as I would like to savor the joy of meeting each of you and getting to know you. On the other hand, I feel as if I can't seem to learn everything I

want to know fast enough so that we can get on with living in God's word together and serving God's people and meeting new people and making disciples and ... and...

I have met with most of the committees and ministry groups of Zion. It has been so wonderful to gain an understanding of all the things that each committee does for the church and for the community. I am continually amazed at the scope of the ministries that Zion supports through member volunteerism, financial support, and prayer support.

I continue my activity as a member of Lower Susquehanna Synod's Transforming Ministry Team. I meet with this committee, led by Pastor Richard Jorgensen, once a month. We serve as a support and think tank for initiatives that promote church health and growth.

I have met the pastors in the Lancaster Conference, and have begun attending the monthly meetings so that I can keep up to date with Conference and Synod activities and programs. I have also joined in the Pericope group that meets weekly to discuss the upcoming Lectionary texts for Sunday.

The local East Petersburg Ministerium is for the most part non-functioning. I am prayerful that the relationship that Zion has had with Trinity UCC and Pastor Chris Rankin can be nurtured and grown as we seek out ways we might be able to minister to the people of East Petersburg together.

I would like to take a moment to thank Pastor Pamela Carnes for her work with Zion as the Intentional Interim Pastor between January 1, 2023 (and before) to May 28, 2023. Having taken the course work to become a certified Intentional Interim Pastor, I recognize the benefit of her work with all of you at Zion. Her work has been a blessing and continues to be a blessing to the people of Zion. And now, as I follow in her footsteps, that work is a blessing to me as well. Here are some of the things that Pastor Carnes did between January and May:

- She led you all through Lent with the return of Wednesday Lenten Suppers and meaningful Lenten worship.
- She provided Bible Study opportunities.
- She visited the sick and shut-in, and blessed the new apartment home of 2 of our beloved members.
- She prayed for you during the call process.
- She continued her work in the community and in the Synod.
- She presided at funerals and she welcomed a new member.

I am excited to see what God has in store for us as we close out 2023, and begin to look forward to 2024. It is my joy and blessing to be your pastor and to know that we are partners in the proclamation of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

### DIRECTOR OF MUSIC - James Riggs

Members of our very faithful choir, and one of the youth, continue to serve as cantors for worship services.

On November 20, 2022, Christ the King Sunday, guest musician Emily Riggs, soprano, sang two solos during worship.

Zion Hosted *Rizzetta's Tones*, a local Celtic band, on December 11, 2022 for a concert in the sanctuary.

I provided a 15-minute prelude of Christmas music for the 2022 Christmas Eve service, together with flutist Sarah Cahoe and cellist Steve Witter.

For my own professional development, I have embarked on a mentoring relationship with an experienced colleague to develop my composition and orchestration skills. We meet online weekly for two hours. I continue to meet with a voice teacher regularly to refine vocal skills and maintain my focus in that area to benefit my work with the choir.

Christian Seay, tenor, provided a wonderful vocal program on May 13, 2023, at 3PM, in the sanctuary.

In June, I attended a music composition workshop in Austin, TX. This workshop is focused on skills needed by today's working church musicians, and features nationally recognized clinicians in both a lecture and master-class format.

The Senior Choir sang through June 4, 2023. They gathered to sing once over the summer. Guest musicians for the summer included Ron Bellamy, solo handbell ringer and Matt Mangus, tenor. Our own members Steve Witter, Saralee Riggs, Dan Bohler, and Alyssa Wagner also provided music for worship.

Fall choir rehearsal resumed on September 7, 2023, and the choir sang for the September 10 worship service.

Two concerts (Sundays at 3 PM) were planned for the fall/winter season. On October 8, Saralee and Jim Riggs, with Debra Ronning, presented a voice/piano program. On December 3, the Piercing Word troupe presented an Advent/Christmas drama with music.

With a talented and committed group of members, the Evangelism Committee remained strong in their efforts throughout 2023. The members of this committee are: Mary Chesters, Lois Jordan, Susan Kametz, Lisa Flood, Bonnie Stebbins, Jack Lesher and Ann Ober. The Pastor also attends all meetings and supports the work of this group.

To a limited extent, the prolonged time required to secure a permanent pastor affected the frequency and size of gatherings in 2022. Intentional Interim Pastor Carnes was a strong supporter of the work of the Committee and with the arrival of Senior Pastor Pam Illick, the committee has a renewed focus to be innovative and ever changing. During 2023, we were able to welcome new member Holly Hackett,

Several key initiatives were sustained throughout the year. Prayer cards that include scripture or words of inspiration were given out with Grab N Go meals. There was also an increased effort to include these folks in Zion, by passing out our newsletter, and flyers on special events and activities. During Advent and Lent, meditation booklets were distributed.

The Circle of Caring Prayer List, and the year-long Grief Program remained active spiritual outreach initiatives championed by Evangelism. The Committee also continued to send cards to members experiencing illness or grief, and to communicate with our sister congregation in Tanzania.

In early spring, the Committee decided to reinstitute the practice of offering refreshments following Sunday services as a way to foster fellowship opportunities for members and guests. The last Sunday of the month was selected and also other committees were invited to share the hosting.

For a period following Zion's Anniversary celebration we continued to feature Faith Stories in our newsletter. These are personal attestations of Faith experienced by individual who volunteer to share their stories. At year end, Pastor Illick, as part of Stewardship, began to gather similar input on what it

means to be a volunteer of Zion, specifically what it means to be part of something larger than ourselves, and to carry out God's word, knowing that our efforts help those who are less fortunate. Along with Stewardship, Evangelism hopes to use the information as a source of inspiration and direction to increase active members and volunteers within Zion.

In the early summer, Zion member, Don Bohler. was instrumental in organizing a bus trip to the annual summer Christian concert in Ocean Grove, NJ. The committee took the need to fill the bus seats as a means to launch the LIFT (Lutherans in Fellowship Together) initiative. It was our hope that area Lutheran churches would include one another in various fellowship opportunities and events. Initial invitations were extended to pastors at St. Peter's, Pembrooke, and Salem, with the intention to expand the effort over time.

The Committee continues to work closely with Charlie Houck and Todd Metzger to use social and print media to enhance Zion's presence through promotion and outreach. A wealth of information and resources are now available online and we are now able to push out messages to the congregation and community. This capability has long been a goal of our committee. In conjunction with these advances, the Committee created fresh print materials, namely flyers to announce the arrival of our new pastor, an all-purpose marketing print piece to advance the image and efforts of Zion. We also updated our simple pew cards to encourage visitors and guests as well as to prompt members of immediate access to support for personal needs. Also, the Committee added an updated pictorial directory as a project to pursue within the next year. This was delayed in order to allow us some time to work with Pastor Illick as she leads us in ways to grow our membership.

Always a highlight of the year for the Committee members is our backpack project. Thanks to the efforts of Susan Kametz and Mary Chesters, the Committee was well stocked for the task of packing school supplies into 50 backpacks for young students. As in past years, Thrivent grants were used to cover a majority of the expenses. A message of encouragement from the church is included in each backpack. After these backpacks were blessed by Pastor Illick, they were delivered to the Hempfield School District for distribution to needy students.

The Committee encouraged the continued presence of Zion in the E. P. community. Although we had planned to participate in the fall E.P. parade, that event was canceled due to rain. We did however support distribution of water bottles with customed-designed message labels at fairground festivities. Board members Cameron Mondock and Charlie Houck arranged to offer a corn hole activity for children. It is the Committee's intention that Zion will continue to look for opportunities for meaningful community involvement and support.

The project to offer a free outdoor children's library was completed by summertime. Special thanks and appreciation go out for the efforts of Mary Chesters, Jeff Gable and Charlie Houck. The immediate interest and use of the library is heartening.

An exciting opportunity arose when, in her first sermon at Zion, Pastor Illick used the image and function of the oxen's yoke to demonstrate our relationship with one another and with Christ. The Committee pursued a way to feature the oxen's yoke in our Welcome Center to connote to members, guests and visitors, Zion's, dedication and commitment to an all-consuming relationship with God. A member donated a beautiful, varnished yoke and Jeff and Kim Gable worked with the Pastor to create a display area. The yoke was dedicated during Pastor's installation.

Also in tandem with Pastor Illick's arrival, Evangelism publicized her installation with an ad in the LNP Clergy Appreciation Month October 15<sup>th</sup> addition.

As we look forward to the new year, the Evangelism Committee is challenged to continue our efforts and commitment to new and impactful ways of fulfilling our mission in a drastically changing world.

- Men's Prayer breakfast is ongoing every 4th Saturday unless a conflict arises.
- Barnstormer baseball game September 17 rained out.
- **Designed a label for water bottles** We call this welcome water as per the label. Acquired 400 half liter bottles and applied the labels. The purpose was to hand these out for free at public events like the East Petersburg Day parade and festival.

### FINANCE COMMITTEE - Don Long

The year of 2023 has been a better, more usual, year for the Finance Committee. During 2022, and also 2021, the Committee was very aware of and concerned about Unified/Unrestricted/General Fund Giving being LESS THAN expenses. Committee Chairs & Ministry Leaders were collectively responsive to reducing our 2023 Budget versus that of 2022 by 5%...did "belt tightening" while attempting to NOT reduce programs and ministries significantly. The reduced 2023 Budget, together with Year-to-Date (YTD) spending being under pro-rata Budget and Giving being higher, has created a more positive situation. Unlike 2022 and 2021, YTD Unified/Unrestricted/General Fund Giving is ABOVE Operating Expenses in 2023; the Treasurer's report herein and to be reviewed at the Annual Meeting will review this in more detail. Accordingly, the approach to the 2024 Budget has been different. The need to provide for inflation's impact has been acknowledged and there has not been a focus on Budget reduction. The 2024 Budget, still a work in process at this writing, appears will review more financial information contained in this same mailing packet (actual September

information and the proposed 2024 Budget), as well as other information presented at the Congregational meeting.

In addition to the Committee's annual efforts in overseeing the Budget's preparation, the Finance Committee has continued to support the many ministries of Zion by overseeing the accounting for the Church's income and overseeing the appropriate disbursement of funds for expenses according to Budget guidelines. More specifically, the Committee typically:

- ensures, in cooperation with the Stewardship Committee and the Financial Secretary (thank you, Pat Crawford!), the proper allocation and recordkeeping of our members' giving;
- reports financial information to Council and the committees each month;
- addresses requests for non-budgeted and Memorial items, when asked;
- monitors the church's investments and insurance coverage;
- offers advice periodically on financial matters and direction; and
- works cooperatively, along with the Treasurer, with periodic audits of the Church's financial records and practices.

In closing, we **greatly** appreciate Barb Breneman's service as our Treasurer – THANK YOU, Barb! Also, special thanks to Shawn Serfass for again serving as Zion's Auditor of 2021. Other current members of the Finance Committee include John Chesters, Lee Ober, Harry Radcliffe & Jack Lesher. Thank you all for your valued time and efforts, notably to Lee for performing desired "independent" reconciliation of our bank accounts monthly!!

### HEALTH, SAFETY & SECURITY COMMITTEE - John Snoke

The "Safety" Committee includes seven dedicated Zion members and Pastor Illick. One of our members, Todd Swiontek, is a former EMT/Fireman. We meet every third Saturday of the month and our mission is to secure the health, safety, and security of Zion's congregates and guests. We are always ready to welcome NEW members to our group!

During the past year, among other pressing items, we have been considering/debating a building wide evacuation process in case of some unforeseen emergency such as a fire, a gas leak, or other emergency. This is not easily accomplished in an older building not designed for easy egress, especially for elderly, handicapped, and/or disabled persons. The process has been excruciatingly slow as we progressed from Pastor, to Covid, to Interim Pastor, to Pastor.

During this process we have realized the need for immediate and strong leadership in a crisis and one of our members, Lee Ober, has now assumed the position of Head Usher/Responder Coordinator. Our link to our Parish Council is Mary Chesters and now Pastor Illick whose interest and leadership are invaluable.

### OUTREACH COMMITTEE - Lee Ober

### "Is not this the fast that I choose: to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house;" Isaiah 58: 6, 7

The Outreach Committee was formed in 2023 as a Standing Committee within our new church Constitution. It brought together some different standalone programs as well as the Service Ministry program. The members now share their ideas and efforts among each other and hope to involve all our Congregational members. Initially, Pastor Carnes brought ideas and enthusiastic support to our meetings. Our Committee's Goal is to serve our congregation, our local community and others in the world, praying and working to be of service to others in need. Our activities this past year are as follows:

- Grab & Go A Community Meals project that provides free lunches on drive-by basis on Mondays. Many in our Congregation volunteer as meal providers or meal managers. Over 2500 meals are distributed each year to those in need.
- Clothing Bank Free clothing, sorted and displayed for those in need. We receive all types of clothing in clean and decent condition.
- 50 year member recognition In November of 2022, Doris Kiehl and her husband George were honored.
- Food Bank Harvest Home Special effort to inform our members of food collection (nonperishable) delivered to Hempfield Area Food Pantry.
- Accepted and displayed a plaque from Tanzania donated by Mrs. Joan Kessler, honoring her husband's wish. It signifies our church's connection to Tanzania as 'Companions In Christ' (the plaque in Swahili "KARABU", meaning <u>Welcome</u>).
- Quilts Our Committee arranged for 6 beautiful quilts, made by our Zion Quilters, to be donated to a local charity, OFF THE STREETS, helping get our homeless off the streets.
- Communicated with special bulletin or newsletter articles the importance of supporting our Lower Susquehanna Synod, World Hunger, Lutheran World Relief, Disaster Relief (Ukraine and Maui Aid), Lancaster Co Council of Churches,
- Home On Ferdinand projects to raise money or purchase needed items to support this transitional home in Manheim for up to 20 single women and mothers with young children. We supplied a few pies to a silent auction event supported by the whole community that raised more than \$10,000. Our congregation members purchased large numbers of Children's Care items in June to provide an inventory of these necessary items for when needed.
- We supported a special plea presented by Pastor Carnes for raising money needed by Habitat for Humanity to fund new home building projects in Columbia and Lebanon for families wanting to own their own homes.
- Spring Cleaning for TLC of Lancaster We asked our church members to donate used or new blankets, other bed linens, personal care items, and cleaning supplies for this Transitional Housing Apartment building to provide suitable shelter for those who need to begin again at providing for themselves. Our collection was a great success.

- Prepared and sent a letter to our neighbor, Amanda Dodson, regarding the temporary parking of their black Mustang in our south parking lot.

- Upgraded our carbon monoxide (CO) alarms.
- Contracted with KE Weaver to replace a bearing in the hot water circulating pump that provides heat and hot water to the kitchen area.
- Coordinated the annual insurance carrier mandated inspection of our 3 heating boilers.
- Coordinated with Janet Hoover to become our new Supply Sexton.
- Researched and contracted for a new plumbing service ASAP Plumbing.
- Contracted with ASAP Plumbing to have the downstairs toilet in the Parish House repaired.
- Prepped and painted the exterior wrought-iron railings and light poles located adjacent to the Broad Street double door entrance.
- Cleaned the exterior and vacuumed the back grill of our industrial-sized refrigerator.
- Coordinated with KE Weaver to conduct the annual preventative maintenance of our three heating boilers.
- Contracted with ASAP Plumbing to repair the drinking fountain located in the narthex.

- Coordinated with EH Gochnauer for the annual preventative maintenance of our air conditioning units.

- Power-washed the exterior of the Property Committee Shed and various other exterior structures.
- Coordinated with Rubio's for annual edging and mulching of church grounds June 2023.
- Repaired a chip in the communion railing.
- Coordinated with Yarnell Security for the annual inspection of our fire/smoke and elevator monitoring systems.
- Contracted with ASAP Plumbing to replace the Parish House basement main water supply shut-off valve.
- Installed "Stop, No Thru Traffic, Private Drive" signs at the north and south entrances to our north/south driveway.

#### Initiatives:

- As the Stewardship Committee, it is our charter to encourage all to take on responsibility not only for an efficiently run ministry but to be better stewards in this world and leave it better than we found it through good service.
- We provide financial and spiritual updates in the monthly newsletters and with the individual quarterly financial statements that are prepared by the Financial Secretary to ensure our congregation is informed of our giving as the year progresses.
- We track the funds that are dedicated to church operating expenses and report positive or negative trends as compared to a weekly prorated budget goal to Council and the Congregation by reports and bulletin board listings.
- We strive to encourage and inspire members to volunteer their time and talent for various committee and ministry positions.

#### Status on volunteering:

Attendance has been dwindling down for the last few years even before the pandemic. This year we seem to have bottomed out and have grown from an average of about 45-50 to 60-70 every Sunday. Unfortunately, with that increase we still find that few people are volunteering to support our Sunday ministry. The result is a select few people continue to volunteer to support our Sunday worship requirements so we would like to have more volunteers. We have started the informational campaign "Acts of Kindness" what does it mean to you to volunteer at Zion. We ask for your assistance to get involved in a committee, council, or any of our charitable organizations. If you would like to become more involved, please contact the Pastor.

#### Status on giving:

We strive to inspire the congregation to give as they are able and to be consistent in their giving. We thank you for your generous giving this year. Our giving so far this year exceeds our expenses and our giving goal. We refer you to the financial reports supplied by the Finance committee for detail. Attendance during the summer is usually low and so is the giving but we did not experience that this year. We want to express our thanks to our members who count the offering that is collected each week and make the bank deposit. In 2024 there will no longer be communion envelopes so there will be just one envelope for each service. This saved a few hundred dollars of our budget in 2024. We still encourage you to set up a monthly electronic giving. If you want to do your offering electronically but need some assistance, please contact Charlie Houck.

#### **Future Plans:**

We are always looking for people to count the Sunday offering and make the bank deposit. Counting the offering does not require any financial training but does require some time following the service on Sundays. If you are unable to commit to this on a regular basis you can volunteer to be a substitute. We are looking to fill open committee positions and Sunday support positions including but not limited to usher, altar setup support, lectors and assisting minister. If you are willing to serve in any of these capacities, please step forward and make your desire known. We are planning a Stewardship event to be held in 2024 so stay tuned for details.

This committee oversees and encourages congregational involvement in all aspects of Zion's worship. Working closely with the Pastor and Director of Music, we strive to create meaningful worship experiences, in keeping with our Lectionary, for all who share with us in worship. The committee oversees music ministry, acolytes, lectors, nursery attendants, altar care, ushers, seasonal sanctuary decorations, the inventory of candles, communion and baptism supplies. The Worship and Music Committee has specific responsibility for music, altar care (including communion and set-up and clean-up), special music guests, equipment (piano & organ and other Zion owned instruments).

This year the Lenten Season began on February 17 with the Ash Wednesday service and the Imposition of Ashes. Sarah Cahoe was our guest flutist and accompanied the choir anthem. The choir sang at all of the midweek services including those during Holy Week. Maundy Thursday was a service of Holy Communion concluding with Dan Bohler singing Psalm 22 during the Stripping of the Altar. On Good Friday Steve Witter played "Go to Dark Gethsemane" on cello. Palm Sunday was celebrated with a palm procession and the reading of the Passion by members of the congregation. Easter Sunday was a joyous service filled with hymns and anthems of praise and a choral prelude by the choir. The youth participated in a Gospel procession.

Under the leadership of Music Director, Jim Riggs, in March of 2023 we held our first "Music at Zion" concert of the season, "A Sacred Meditation of Psalms, Hymns and Spiritual Songs". Featured were Chrystian Seay, tenor, and Jordan Markham on piano. The music was expertly performed and appreciated by the audience. The Worship and Music committee provided a reception afterward.

On May 28, the church was decorated with geraniums for Pentecost. The flowers were then planted on the church grounds for summer color. Red carnations were also provided for the new members who were honored at the luncheon that day, as well as a red floral arrangement to honor Pastor Carnes on her last day with our congregation.

On June 15 Ron Bellamy, always a favorite guest, returned with his handbells to provide some beautiful music during our worship service. On October 22, a Service of Healing was held including recognition of Zion's members who are EMTs, nurses, doctors, and all in health and wellness services.
